**The Wellbeing team** led by Ms Wilkinson supported by Ms Dracopoulos have been busily working on implementing the recommendations and initiatives outlined in our 'Internal Review'. The 'Keys' initiative was presented at the last P&C meeting led by Mr Cutrupi and Ms Abihanna (members of the welfare team). One of the highlights was an indigenous dance show where the teachers were asked to participate in a traditional "brolga" dance. Thankyou to student adviser Ms Kyriacou and assistant adviser Mr Manning and stage coordinator Mr Leggett for organising the camp, along with Mr O'Donnell for organising the peer support leaders. Thanks also to the following teachers who attended the camp: Ms O'Donnell, Ms Veal, Ms Arevalo, Mr Wyndham, Mr Ritchie and Dennis Laris, our Student Support Officer.



Aliki Tsopanian (pictured with her mother above right) received the Soroptimist Award at NSW Parliament House. Soroptimist is a global women's organization whose members volunteer to improve the lives of women and girls through programs leading to social and economic empowerment.



The organization is particularly concerned with providing women, and girls, access to education, as this is the most effective path to self-determination. The name, Soroptimist, means "best for women," and that's what the organization strives to achieve. Soroptimists are women at their best, working to help other women to be their best. Aliki is a worthy recipient of this award and a wonderful ambassador for the school.

#### **WOO World of Opportunity**

The WOO (World of Opportunity) students in year 10 have been finalising their entrepreneurial product, an online design market for our students, in preparation for the final presentation in Melbourne in May. Professor Yong Zhao will be in attendance from the USA, along with student representatives from the community of schools involved in the program from across NSW and Victoria. The WOO program now includes eight year 9 students who expressed an interest to join the program. They recently participated with the year 10 WOO students in a three day workshop called "Young Change Agents/What's your mission", a program initiated by Atlassian (the internationally renowned Australian software company). Our WOO students now have a better understanding of the creative and innovative skills required to be entrepreneurial in a future beyond school.



The Literacy and Numeracy team have devised an action plan in response to the Department of Educations 'HSC Stronger Standards' initiative. Part of the action plan has included year 9 students completing past NAPLAN writing and numeracy tasks and then working with teacher mentors to formulate a set of goals and personal bests in response to the results received in the tasks. All teachers recently participated in an online course to become familiar with the criteria for NAPLAN writing tasks. Team members attended a symposium on Visible Learning featuring Professor John Hattie to analyse the science of how students learn. The focus question was: What's the key to effective learning? That question has been the focus of Professor Hattie's academic research for more than 20 years. His latest research supports the conclusion that "it's not just what you know, it's what you know about what you know- and it's what you know about how you know" that is crucial for new learning to occur. To put it more simply, anytime a student learns, she or he has to bring in two kinds of prior knowledge: knowledge about the subject/task at hand and knowledge about how learning works. The symposium focused on understanding how this learning occurs and provided the Literacy and Numeracy team members with ideas and insights into why this is important and how we as teachers can ensure that we are attending to this aspect of learning. The Model of Learning that was discussed at the symposium defines learning as: "the process of developing sufficient surface knowledge to then move to deeper understanding such that one can appropriately transfer this learning to new tasks and situations" (Hattie and Donoghue). The Literacy and Numeracy team will include Hattie's research on student learning into their action plan.

Year 12 mentoring and coaching workshops were launched in week 9. Students will meet with head teacher "coaches" in targeted workshops that cover specific academic topics to support their learning in the lead up to their HSC examinations. The mentoring system with nominated teachers has also resumed with a more structured approach that targets student wellbeing. Overall, the aim of the program is to develop good habits, along with the following goals:

- Target specific needs
- Refine practice
- Increase proficiency and competence
- Provide encouragement and guidance
- Engage with learning and goals
- Growth mindset
- Personal bests
- Goal setting and achievement

There was an article in the local press recently by education specialist Greg Whitby on why '**Regular attendance is crucial**'. Whitby states "Research shows that absenteeism has an affect on academic performance/it reduces the opportunities for students to build resilience, develop strong relationships and establish healthy habits/One absence per fortnight equals 20 days a year. That equates to 1.3 years over 13 years of schooling. That is a huge amount of lost learning/Of course, some absences are unavoidable, but it's important for teachers, parents and students to understand the impact that non-attendance has on wellbeing and academic achievement". When put in those terms, the importance of regular school attendance is undeniable.

With the onset of cooler weather, we would encourage all of our students to be prepared with the correct **school uniform** item, such as a jumper, sloppy joe, track suit jacket or coat. All available of these items are available from our uniform shop. A reminder that we are a full uniform school and it is an expectation that students from years 7 to 12 where the correct uniform at all times, including black, enclosed leather shoes. The school sports uniform is to be worn by all students in years 7 to 10 on Tuesdays only. If students have PE, they are to pack that uniform and shoes separately. If for some reason a student is out of uniform, they are to bring a note and present it to the deputy and get a uniform pass.

School resumes for all students in term two, the day after Anzac Day, on Wednesday 26<sup>th</sup> April.

#### **Health Plans**

# Respect Responsibility Relationships

### An interview with DHSVAD Artist in Residence – Alex Karaconji

In your work 'The Flanuer'\* you focus solely on your surroundings. What about your surroundings have driven or influenced you to make your work this way?

So I was studying these surroundings each day, so it was the familiarity of the surroundings...but it was also the challenge of being able to make an artwork out of really mundane, everyday subject manner. If I could get someone to be interested in a chair or a flag then that was a good thing.

#### What artists are you inspired by?

Impressionist painters, so the 'flanuer' was a kind of a character that existed around the 1900s in France, so this is about the same time that you have impressionism, a little bit of expressionism, so these art movements all existed at the similar time. People like Monet, Van Gogh, all the kind of artwork you'll see in prints on walls at a GP or hospital. But, in real life it was mind blowing.



### When studying to become an artist, did you have any doubts and how did you deal with them?

Definitely, a little bit of self-confidence that bordered on delusion! So, I thought I was amazing, but I don't know if it was grounded on anything substantial or true. You've got to kind of believe in yourself to the point where it almost becomes too much. It helps if you have supportive parents and high school teachers. If you have a cool, encouraging teacher, it ends up having a large influence that lasts a long time.

#### Do you prefer working from life or a photograph?

That's always been tricky because to be a good artist you are supposed to paint through life, the impressionists painted from life. But what I think I've realised is it doesn't matter what you use, it's the end result. So if you use photo, your imagination, it's important not to get too caught up in those categories, anything really.

### How have you enjoyed being an Artist in Residence? What has been a highlight?

It has been really good, the kids have been surprisingly really excited and interested and very focused, I've had a few cool classes. I did an animation class with the year sevens which was wicked. I got them to draw an image thirty-six times and they were actually pretty excited by it so that was a good, unexpected outcome.

#### How many drawings go into one of your animations?

For one second its twelve drawings, so if I've got three seconds that's thirty six drawings, so if I've got 6 minutes, it's a long process

### When you finished studying, how did you get yourself known and start out in your art career?

Art school was really good because they introduce you to people you meet in creative franchises which mentor you to get to know gallery owners. It's a slow process of meeting people, getting your name out, putting work into prizes and stuff like that. It's a very slow career so, you shouldn't be too impatient.

### A word from the English Faculty

Welcome back to the school year! It is wonderful to see everyone so fresh for the year ahead.

Last year's Year 12 students achieved excellent results, particularly in English Standard, English, Extension 1 and 2. These results were achieved through a combination of diligence and commitment in completing all aspects of the courses on offer. It is very gratifying to know that our students can achieve at the highest level in the most challenging courses. Classes have quickly settled into a very positive mindset for the 2017 school year and are approaching their coursework with a strong sense of purpose. In 2017:

Year 7 have started explored the concept of the hero and the hero's journey through a number of texts such as the *Hunt for the Wilder People*. In this unit they have been developing their writing skills, particularly in writing structured paragraphs.

Year 8 have examined the Science Fiction genre with close study of texts such as *Ender's* Game.

Year 9 also commenced with a genre study, Crime Fiction, where they explored works such as Arthur Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes and a Raymond Chandler short story. This unit climaxed with students writing a creative short story based on a constructed crime scene in the hidden shadows of the school.



Year 10 have completed a novel study, *To Kill A Mockingbird*, to understand the meaning in the text and what makes it a classic text.

Year 11 have commenced the preliminary H.S.C. with their focus on the Area of Study theme of the Journeys.

Year 12 is well into their HSC courses. The Advanced class is currently studying the novel *Nineteen Eighty Four* and the classic science fiction film from 1927,*Metropolis* in the comparative study module. The Standard classes are examining the play *The Shoehorn Sonata*.

This year's HSC Drama class attended an Onstage performance in preparation for their major works. Mr Huber has already started to organise the debating teams for this year. Good luck to all those involved.

I would also like to celebrate our excellent results in the 2016 HSC, having achieved the best results ever, including 4 students achieving Band 6 in Design and Technology and one student with Band 6 in Textiles and Design and 85% of students in the highest 2 bands. I would also like to thank the Year 12 teachers for their dedication and hard work for these results to be achieved.

#### Year 7 and 8

Year 7 and 8 students undertake 3 units of work per year on a rotational base. Year 7 focuses on Jewellery Design, Multimedia Design (animation) and Food Development Design, while Year 8 works on Architectural Design, Industrial Design (timber) and Textiles Design

The duration of each unit of work is 12 weeks, which includes the study of design theory, the design process and the completion of a design project, where students apply problem solving, decision making, creative and critical thinking skills.

#### Year 9 and 10

Elective subjects in Years 9 and 10 are Design and Technology, Industrial Technology- Timber and Food Technology. In addition, the Design and Technology faculty offers the following NEO courses: Textiles Design, Food Design, Video Game Design, Design, Draw and Make and Graphic Design. All courses are now finalising their first unit of work and assessment tasks, students are working enthusiastically to achieve the outcomes to the best of their ability.

#### Year 11 and 12

Y12 Design and Technology, Industrial Technology –Timber and Textiles and Design students are working very enthusiastically with their Major Design Projects. Students are working on a variety of projects, from Architecture to Jewellery Design, from Interior Design to Industrial Design; all projects show high complexity problems and high creative

#### **Subject Fees**

#### **Department of Education - Elective Subject Contributions**

Subject fees are distinct from school contributions. Subject fees add to the Faculty budges and allow the school to purchase more materials used by students. Within the Design and Technology department, the majority of our budget is spent on consumables, such as food, timber, fabric, etc. That is, the day to day materials and equipment that we depend upon to deliver our specialised curriculum to your child. #### Dear Parents and Carers

In July 2016, the NSW government announced changes to the Higher School Certificate for 2020 which affects current Year 9 students. These changes require students demonstrate a minimum standard of functional Literacy and Numeracy to be eligible for the HSC.

The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) has provided the following information to schools:

- From 2020, students need to demonstrate a minimum Literacy and Numeracy standard to be eligible for the HSC as measured by NAPLAN tests.
- There will be multiple opportunities to pass online Reading, Writing and Numeracy tests before and after the HSC.
- Students with Band 8 or above for Year 9 NAPLAN results in Reading, Writing and Numeracy
  will not need to sit the online tests.
- Some students, including those studying Life Skills courses, will not need to meet the minimum standard to be awarded the HSC.
- Students who are recently arrived in the country and who have a background other than English will not need to meet the minimum standard.

#### What this means in practice

- The minimum standard in Band 8 or above in Year 9 NAPLAN Reading, Writing and Numeracy tests.
- Students who do not achieve a Band 8 in any one of these tests will be given the opportunity to undertake an online Reading, Writing and Numeracy tests of an equivalent standard to NAPLAN in Years 10, 11 and 12. It is our understanding that these tests will be offered at least twice per year.
- Students will only have to sit the online tests in areas in which they have not yet met the
  minimum standard. For example, if they achieve a Band 9 in Reading and Numeracy, but a
  Band 7 in Writing, they need only undertake the Writing test.
- All students will be entitled to undertake the HSC in Year 12. However, students who do not
  meet the minimum standard in one or more areas by the time they sit their HSC exams, will
  receive a Record of School Achievement (ROSA) rather than a HSC.
- Students who *do not* achieve the minimum standard by the completion of the HSC (Year 12) will have a further 5 years after starting the HSC to continue completing the online tests in an attempt to reach the minimum standard. Once they achieve the minimum standard, they will receive their HSC.

Dulwich High School of Visual Arts and Design has made the following decisions in response to these changes:

- The school is *highly confident* that the vast majority of students will achieve the minimum standard in the online tests in time for the commencement of the HSC.
- The Learning Support Team will use data from Year 7 NAPLAN and other assessments to target students who are at risk of not achieving the minimum standard in Year 9 NAPLAN tests.
- The school is implementing whole-school Literacy and Numeracy strategies to boost the skills of all students and includes explicit teaching of Literacy & Numeracy across KLA's.

#### What this means for parents and carers

Parents and carers of students are encouraged to do the following:

- Reassure your child that a failure to meet the minimum standard in the Year 9 NAPLAN tests does not mean they have jeapordised their HSC.
- Encourage your child to perform to the best of their ability in the Year 9 NAPLAN tests.
- Encourage your child to read widely. Reading a variety of texts will enable students to improve their vocabularies, enhance their writing and expand their overall knowledge. Parents are encouraged to ask their child what they are reading and questions about the text. Don't limit reading to fiction. Newspapers, magazines, online articles and non-fiction books are also an excellent source of reading material, particularly as they develop a broader vocabulary.
- Encourage your child to attend the Free Homework Centre offered by the school on Wednesday in the Learning Centre (Library). Experienced staff are available to work with students, particularly on their numeracy.

### **Teaching and Learning Faculty**

The Learning Centre in the library continues to be a vibrant hub of learning. Under the guidance of Mr Robson, students who have attended the library at lunch time have actively engaged in stimulating activities that involve coding and electronics. In addition, a 3D printer has been installed to enable students to create objects they have digitally designed.

The Teaching and Learning Faculty will again deliver the MultiLit Reading Tutor program along with the QuickSmart Numeracy program this year. Student Learning Support Officers have also initiated the delivery of the STARS (Strategies to Achieve Reading Success) reading comprehension program to support student learning across subject areas. The results and progress of students completing these programs over the last few years has been very pleasing and the school looks forward to seeing students achieve in these programs in this year.

### **Raise Mentoring At DHSVAD**

In 2016 Dulwich High School of Visual Arts and Design was successfully involved with the RAISE student mentoring program. Raise Foundation aims to improve the lives of young people in the community by providing school, and community based mentoring programs. The programs focus on helping young people make informed choices, improve their relationships, advance their wellbeing and coping strategies, increase their self-confidence, identify and achieve their goals, and engage in further education and employment.

The RAISE student mentoring will soon be starting, with students in years 8 and 9 invited to participate in this exciting initiative.

Raise mentoring facilitates one-on-one mentoring, followed by group discussions. All mentors complete accredited training in Mentoring in the Community through TAFE NSW, and they undergo the compulsory Working with Children and Police Checks, as well as providing personal and employment references.

As part of the mentoring program, participating students also complete a self-interest community project. This can be to investigate an area of interest, promote a particular cause, interview a community representative amongst other ideas. A previous student chose to create a poster to raise awareness about strategies to help reduce stress; the poster has been displayed on various noticeboards around the school and is a great visual reminder for the school community.

## **Careers News**

#### FREE TUTORING AVAILABLE:

The University of Sydney Union (USU) will be once again running the School Tutoring Program .The program aims to support students who are studying in the HSC Years (11 and 12) and who may need some additional support.

**Where**: The program takes place at the University of Sydney Wentworth Building. Students need to arrange their own mode of transport to the University for their tutoring sessions.

**When**: Tutoring sessions will take place for 1 hour each week at an agreed time between Monday to Friday 3:30pm-5:30pm. The program will run from March 6th – June 9th, 2017 and August 7- November 3rd, 2017

**Cost**: FREE – this program is a free program run by the USU. NB: tutors are current students of the University of Sydney who hold a Working With Children's Check (WWCC) and are volunteers for the STP.

#### Dear Parents and Carers

In Term 1 2017 your school is taking part in the *Tell Them From Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help them improve. The survey is completed on-line and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Staff in schools will <u>not</u> be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

As well as schools getting student feedback, the Department of Education, through the Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE), has access to data from across NSW and is running a research project to look at state-wide patterns of student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices. The research is looking at how these things impact on student outcomes, including academic performance. Individual students and schools will <u>not</u> be identified in any CESE publications, and all information will be handled in accordance with the relevant privacy legislation. Students' personal information will not be disclosed by the Department to any other person or body other than as required by law.

This research will help schools in New South Wales to better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable answering any question, he/she should leave it blank and move on to the next question. Your child can stop the survey at any time.

If you <u>do not want</u> your child to take part in the survey, please complete the attached form and return it to school by 7<sup>th</sup> April 2017.
