
We are excited to start creating and producing music across a range of genres that facilities of this nature allow us to do.

From the Principal



Variation to School Development Days for end of the year.

Last year the school embarked on delivering professional learning after hours. Coaching and Mentoring

The WOO (World of Opportunity) students in year 10 travelled to Melbourne in May to present their innovative and entrepreneurial product, an online design market known as Collective Seven (C7), to students from across twenty schools in NSW and Victoria. This initiative, known as Paradigm Shifters, was organised by The Mitchell Institute and supervised by Professor Yong Zhao, who was very impressed with the C7 enterprise. Well done to Georgia Athanasopoulos, Louise Personeni, Clara Metcalfe-Lowe, Toby Samuel, Aki Tsionis and Curtis Maguire. These students are mentoring a group of year 9 students who will be the next generation of WOO students overseeing the design market.

Year 11 and 12 students have begun their coaching courses, working with head teachers twice a term discussing character strengths, growth mindsets, personal bests and goal setting. Students have also been allocated mentor teachers with whom they meet more frequently and informally.

We are a school of high expectations. Science Updates

Welcome back to another term at DHSVAD. I would like to thank staff, parents and students for your support and warm welcome in my appointment as the new Head Teacher Science. I look forward to strengthening the profile of the Science Faculty across the school and will continue to develop enrichment programs and initiatives to maximise student learning outcomes.

The Science Faculty has been busy during Term 2 marking assessments, compiling reports and it's been rewarding to see students across all years achieving excellent grades in Science.

Some of the highlights in Science include:

- The Big Science Competition was held on the 31st May. This international competition was open to students of all abilities from years 7-10 but was compulsory for all 7, 8 and 9 SOC classes. The competition consisted of 30 questions based on contemporary issues in Science and tested students critical thinking, problem solving skills and science knowledge.
- Parents and teachers will receive reports on how students performed that will help identify areas of strength and where improvement can be made.
 Each student who took part will receive a certificate as well as detailed feedback on their performance in the competition and will also go into a draw to win cash prizes!
- Implemented initiatives such as the new course in Senior Science this year called 'Earth and Environmental Science' and iStem-a unit on Robotics with the Year 9 SOC class.
- The Green Team led by Mr Cutrupi and Briony our resourceful lab assistant have been involved in bush regeneration and planting of natives such as Acacia, Callistemon and Bottlebrush in the Graham Green.
- Year 7 have been studying Separating Mixtures and have been enjoying using separating techniques such as filtration and evaporation to separate solutions in lab classes.

- Year 8 have been studying Ecology this term and are currently presenting their speeches on a disappearing ecosystem and an endangered species. Students have really enjoyed collecting first hand data from different "ecosystems" around the school and have understood the effect abiotic factors have on different organisms in the ecosystem.
- Year 9 have been studying Electricity and have learnt to construct and label the components of series and parallel circuits. They have also calculated the energy and efficiency of various electrical appliances.
- Year 10 have been studying Genetics and have learnt to extract DNA from peas.
- Year 11 Earth and Environmental Science
 Class went to the Field of Mars for a Field Trip
 recently. The students used skills developed in
 the classroom to collect first hand data from the
 two sites and assessed the human impacts on
 the local environment.
- Year 11 Biology classes will also be travelling to the Field of Mars on the 29th June observing The National Park Reserve and working through mandatory field work experiments to enhance their learning of The Local Ecosystem unit.
- Year 12 Science students will be sitting for their trial exams early next term. On behalf of the Science Faculty we would like to wish them the best of luck

Students will have the opportunity to work on their projects during the school holidays as teachers have volunteered to come to assist students with their practical work or preparation for exams.

All year 12 Major Projects will be exhibited on 18 August in our yearly Design Exhibition.

Recently, the Sydney Morning Herald published the HSC Study Guide 2017, with advice from expert teachers to students.

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

Isidoro Felman

Dulwich High School of Visual Arts

You learn about Design and Technology by spending extensive time investigating and responding to an identified need or opportunity.

The Major Design Project (MDP) encompasses three areas

- Project proposal.
- Project development and realisation.
- Project evaluation.

Exemplary proposals

- Work with a real need and/or opportunity.
- Have a real client and or end-user.
- Incorporate an emerging technology or innovation.
- Take into account the impacts on the environment and society.

Question whether your solution uses the best possible materials. Can you reduce the environmental impact? Is there an innovative method of producing or marketing your project? Make sure you have thorough criteria to evaluate success to use in your evaluation stage.

Project development and realisation

There is no such thing as "Because I like it" in Design and Technology. All decisions should be based on research, testing and experimentation. Research provides the necessary data to develop your project.

At this stage, you should be well advanced in the realisation of your project. Well thought out sketches and construction drawings are important for its successful completion. There is a variety of free digital software that can help you.

Testing and experimenting is also of paramount importance. Try your materials and experiment with techniques before you apply them to ensure you produce a highquality final prototype. Allow enough time to produce your final solution. Ideas may not work at first and you may need extra time. Time, patience and attention to detail are vital.

Evaluation

Don't miss this important part of the design process due to poor time management. Evaluate against the functional, aesthetic and other relevant design factors, using the evaluation methods stated in your Criteria to Evaluate Success.

It is also an advantage to have the project evaluated by the intended end user and/or a relevant design expert (architect, industrial designer, fashion designer, etc). It does not matter if it is a positive or negative evaluation report, it is what you learn from these evaluations that is important. Evaluate the process you went through, contrast the proposed action and time plan with what actually happened: what went as expected, what went wrong, what would you do differently? It does not matter if it was not the ideal process.

Written exam

Practise 4-6 multiple choice questions **a day**. Note the questions you have difficulty with and revise that theory content or ask your teacher. The more you practise, the better prepared you will be.

In the Short and Extended Response questions, consider using a structured approach such as ALARM (A Learning and Responding Matrix) to provide a more refined and relevant answer.

TEXTILES AND DESIGN

RECORD ALL YOUR INSPIRATIONS.

By now you should be working steadily on your major project. Aim to submit a finished item, as incomplete items are less likely to achieve high marks. Work towards displaying complex design features and creativity. Make sure you show a high standard of manufacture. Attention to detail is important. Ask yourself: 'Are you showing proficiency in the skills you have chosen to use?'

Supporting documents. Use the Major Textiles Project Marking Guidelines and FAQ on the NESA site to guide the development of your supporting documentation. Keep to the page limit for each section. No title pages are permitted. Font is important. It must be clear, easy to read and equivalent to Size 12 Times New Roman. If you include a photo of your completed item include it on one of your pages.

Design Inspiration should include a collage of pictures/samples from a variety of sources. Record all your inspirations. Don't just have lots of pictures of the same thing! This

section requires critical analysis. Simply naming or describing your historical/cultural or contemporary factors is not enough. Critically analyse their impact.

Visual Design Development also requires critical analysis of the functional and aesthetical features of your design. Include well labelled sketches that clearly show development, including how your design progressed from one idea to the next.

Manufacturing Specification is a description of the finished item. Describe it accurately. Your production drawing and pattern pieces should be neat and clearly labelled.

Investigation, Experimentation and

Evaluation must include an extensive range from the materials, equipment and manufacturing processes you have used. Choose evidence applicable to your item and include examples of the actual experimentation, not just one sample. Evaluate your use of fibre, yarns and fabrics and relate this to the end use of your textile item.

In the exam questions can come from all areas of the syllabus. Understand the vocabulary and textile and design terminology, make revision notes for all syllabus content and identify all key terms, for example dyeing, workers' skills, washable webs, soil-resistant finishes and sustainable textiles.

Section I (Multiple Choice)

Time yourself. There is enough time to work through steadily. Don't rush.

Section II

The marks awarded for each question should guide the depth of your response. Answer the question. Relate your response back to it. Use examples.

Section III

Remember when looking at past papers for revision that there is a change for this year. For the first time you will answer two questions, one based on the Area of Study: Design, and one based on the Area of Study: Properties and Performance of Textiles. Each question is worth 8 marks so an in-depth response is required. Plan your answers, use Textiles and Design terminology, and where appropriate back up your responses with examples.

Careers News

As we approach Term 3 students in Yrs 10 and 12 need to turn their attention towards the future with Yr10 choosing subjects for 2018 and Yr12 submitting applications for university and TAFE next term. Students will be assisted in these processes but also need to take time to consider their options, discuss with parents and carers, teachers and Careers Adviser and gather information so as to make the best choices for themselves. The recent Careers Expos, Work Experience are also valuable opportunities to gain information and insights into future pathways.

Yr10 Work Experience

Parents and carers are reminded that Work Experience will take place in Term 4 - Nov 20-Dec 2. It is a very important opportunity for students to test out their career interests where possible and gain insights that can assist with decisions about HSC and other career plans. Students were issued all of the required information and forms in Term 1 in both print and as an email (sent to their school email). Parents/Carers were also emailed these documents , please notify me if you did not receive them . Parents/Carers are an important source of assistance to students in securing work experience through their encouraging students to seek suitable employers as well as through networks of family, friends and employment and are welcome to contact me if interested in discussing work experience options. It would be greatly appreciated if parents and carers help ensure that work experience arrangements ie securing places and submission of the Student Placement Record to the Careers office are completed by the end of Term3.

University Applications

Application for university and associated programs take place in Term 3. Students will be guided and assisted with online UAC applications which will be due in late September. There are however a number of programs that require earlier application including *Early Offer Schemes* or will require additional attention including *Educational Access Schemes and scholarships*.

University Early Offer Schemes

Some universities offer students the opportunity to apply for an EARLY OFFER on the basis of school recommendation and other criteria. The following universities have EARLY OFFER schemes in NSW:

To be eligible for EAS consideration a student's educational performance must have been seriously affected, normally for a period of at least six months during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent, due to circumstances beyond their control and choosing. Year 10

This term, Year 10 students have been increasingly working towards gaining knowledge and skills in preparation for Stage 6 schooling.

As a teacher of 100 for HSIE, I have seen my students progress significantly through a number of research and writing skills which I know to be essential for success in Years 11 and 12. I am aware that a range of other subject areas have been designing assessment to further develop these skills in our students and I would like to thank teachers for their work in this regard.

As of Week 8, Year 10 have also made a start on their subject selection for Stage 6. First, we had Mr Spetere (Careers Adviser) speak to the group at a Year Meeting. He provided students with a breakdown of TVET and VET course options and other possibilities for students' patterns of study in the coming years. He also invited all of Year 10 to attend the Western Sydney Careers Expo on 21 June. The cost for this excursion is \$15 and will allow the students to speak with representatives from different educational institutions and employment sectors. It is hoped that this experience will help students make informed choices for their subjects.

In addition, all Year 10 students will receive a 'coaching' lesson in the next fortnight which will provide more direct assistance to individual students with regards to their specific patterns of study, any prerequisite subjects they'd like to pursue post-school, and the like.

They will also take steps towards financial independence by attending the Commonwealth Bank's 'StartSmart' financial literacy workshops. ABOUT US

ASteen is a Sydney social group for young people aged 13 and over, diagnosed with high functioning Autism Spectrum Disorder (previously known as Asperger's Syndrome) who are generally capable of functioning without specialist help. ASteen was started in 2004 by a group of parents to fill an unmet need for their AS teens, who were able to communicate and interact with others but had difficulty doing this in mainstream situations.

The group gives our teens the opportunity to socialise with others like themselves in a supportive environment. From feeling like complete outsiders, ASteen has given many of them a sense of belonging and the confidence that they too can make friends. In fact, many of our original members are now young adults and still enjoy the family outings.

OUTINGS AND COSTS

There is no cost to join the group; just the cost of the outings themselves. Our outings range from picnics,

museum trips and movies through to putt-putt golf, ghost tours, and theatre visits.

Outings are held all over the Sydney region, and members come from as far away as Berowra in the north, the Blue Mountains in the west, Miranda in the south and Bondi in the east. Families take turns to organise outings, which occur fortnightly on weekends. From time to time, members organise ad hoc activities outside the regular schedule, and this works well too.

Suggestions for outings are entered into a calendar, which is updated from time to time and circulated by a volunteer calendar coordinator; final details are emailed to members by the host family shortly before each event. New families are encouraged to help plan outings, as the group is always looking for new things to see and do.

Attendance varies, depending on the outing, weather, the mood of the teens, holidays etc. We are quite flexible about this and understand if outings occasionally need to be cancelled or postponed at the last minute.

COMMUNICATION

We communicate through a Yahoo email group, which is moderated by volunteer parents. The email group is not used as a support mechanism and is primarily for the purpose of organising activities. Information relating to Autism Spectrum Disorders is also circulated from time to time, for informational purposes only.

Every few months, we circulate a list containing the mobile phone numbers of the parents whose families attend outings regularly. This is a handy tool to help members locate each other when arriving at activities. We generally wait for a family to attend a few outings before putting them on this list, as it would be far too unwieldy to include the large number of families who are members of the wider group.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

One of the features that we feel makes ASteen successful is that parents, and often siblings and family friends, attend the outines with their teens.

We find that unlike mainstream teenagers, AS teens like having parents along as it gives them a sense of security. The parents also enjoy our outings because it is a chance to make friends amongst others who understand. At the same time, because we are not a professional "service", it ensures that the responsibility for the safety of the teens is carried by their own family.

WILL IT HELP MY SON/DAUGHTER?

The group does not work for everyone. Whilst there are many AS teens who are keen to make friends but lack the necessary skills, there are also those who prefer their own company. These young people might attend a few outings and decide that they don't like group environments. That said, many AS teens have gotten and continue to get a lot of enjoyment from our group and have forged new friendships, as have their parents.

How to Join Us

Please contact our volunteer coordinator Adrienne De Morais on 0413 890 311 for membership enquiries or more information.

If the group is suitable for your teen, you will be given further information about completing a registration form and the Working with Children (WWC) Check.

The WWC check is required by NSW law. It needs to be completed by most primary carers who have responsibility for young people and wish to participate in the group. However, there are exceptions in certain instances, for example if your child is under the age of 18.

From Our School Counsellor

Tips for a healthy headspace



Change your self-talk

Self-talk is the way that you talk to yourself, that voice inside your head. It can be positive (e.g. "I can make it through this exam") or negative (e.g. "I'm never going to be able to pass this subject"). There are a number of things you can do to change the direction of your self-talk. First, listen to your inner voice - is your self-talk helping you or reinforcing bad feelings? Next, try to replace your negative thoughts with more realistic ones. Try to look for a more rational spin of strategies to tackle your self-talk the more you'll feel confident and in control of yourself.

Develop assertiveness skills

Being assertive means standing up for your own rights; valuing yourself and valuing others' opinions without letting them dominate you. This can help build your self-esteem and self-respect. Being assertive is not the same as being aggressive. Remember to always listen, be prepared to compromise and be respectful of the other person's opinion, while still being confident, calm and knowing what you want.

Relax

There are many ways to relax and different relaxation techniques to use to overcome stress. Progressive muscle relaxation involves tensing and relaxing specific groups of muscles from your feet all the way to your head, while focussing on your feelings of tension and relaxation. You could also try breathing techniques, such as deep breathing or focussed breathing (breathing in through the nose and as you breathe out say a positive statement to yourself like 'relax' or 'calm down'). Place a hand over your diaphragm to make sure you're breathing slowly – you should feel your hand move if you're doing it right. Focus on breathing in slowly for 4 seconds, holding your breath for 2 seconds and breathing out slowly for 6 seconds.

Practice conflict resolution

Having a hard time with friends or family is difficult for most people. Talking through the issues in a calm and thoughtful way is the best approach.

Avoid getting personal, be willing to compromise and listen to their perspective.

Help and be kind to others

Do something to help someone else. Acts of kindness help other people but also make you feel good. Give a compliment, offer to help someone out or volunteer either on a onceoff project or an ongoing basis and allow yourself to feel good for making someone else feel good.

Be socially active and get involved

Social relationships are really important to your general wellbeing. It is okay to take time out for yourself but friends can provide support when you're having a tough time. Spending time with friends is also really important for keeping and building on existing friendships. Getting involved with volunteer work, hobbies, clubs or committees, or sports can help you feel connected to your wider community while also meeting new people. If you're not feeling up to going out, even a phone call, email, text message or Facebook message can help us feel connected to friends and family.

Play



Play is important for staying mentally healthy. Devoting time to just having fun can recharge your battery, revitalise your social networks, and reduce stress and anxiety.



A problem can sometimes be too hard to solve alone, even with support from friends and family. Be honest with yourself about when you may need support and get professional help. You can see your general practitioner (GP), make an appointment to chat to someone at your local **headspace** centre or visit **eheadspace.org.au**. Finding help might feel scary at the start but it gets easier over time. Getting support can help you to keep on track with school, study or work, and in your personal and family relationships. The sooner you get help the sooner things can begin to improve for you.


