

Come and celebrate the success of our Design students and enjoy the catering and refreshments made by the Hospitality students.



Design Month

Congratulations to the TAS faculty and students for a wonderful, successful and creative design month. There were many favourites but I particularly like the gelato workshops! The golden hair on the gelato was an insightful touch! Looking forward to the exhibition.

The KEYS program that was presented at one of the P&C meetings was launched at the beginning of this term. KEYS is a response to the findings of the internal review of the welfare and discipline policy. Congratulations to the Welfare Team in particular Mr Cutrupi and Ms Abihanna who are the main drivers and authors of the program and the staff who are delivering the program.

Student Portal is up and running. This software provides information between home and school for students and parents. Further in this bulletin more information is provided.

Attendance including lateness - all students are required to be at school by 8.45 ready to start learning. Parents are requested to ensure that this happens on a daily basis. Notes explaining absence and lateness are required with parental signatures. Students are to take these to the attendance office.

Uniform - we are a uniform school. Please ensure that your children wear uniform every day. If you need assistance with uniforms we do have a 2^{nd} hand uniform shop. There is also assistance if you are having financial hardship. Not wearing the uniform is a safety concern for our school. Wearing the uniform provides staff with a visual check of who belongs to our school and our community. It gives the message to staff, the wider community and to the student that "I am ready to learn and I belong".

Year 12 - 13 years of schooling is coming to an end for our year 12 students. Notes on the upcoming events will be sent home shortly. A reminder to all students to stay focussed, attend classes on time, be willing to learn and revise for the upcoming exams. Historically our research indicates that students who maximise their learning with the teacher do well. The study hub is open for seniors Tuesday after 12.30 and Wednesdays for all students. Staff are there to help with any work, study plans and goals.

NAPLAN - The results will be given to each student to take home in the next few days.

DHSVAD Enews app - download the app onto your phone, it's free and you get important information about tasks, excursions and events. Students can download the app as well. It is a great communication tool.

Important events

August will be a busy time as they submit major projects for the practical components of their subjects. A highlight will be their **Graduation** on Thursday 22nd September in the multi-purpose hall from midday. More details will be provided closer to the time.

Design Month has been underway with some excellent workshops including: drone deliveries, gelato making, resin jewellery, dyeing and carving, to name a few. The culmination of this initiative will be a Design Market and the Design Exhibition to be held on Wednesday 16th August at 6.30pm. More details about these events will to be forthcoming. Congratulations to the TAS faculty for organising this exciting initiative for our students.

Preparations are well underway for **Diversity Day Wear it Purple** towards the end of August. More details will be provided in upcoming weeks.

The **KEYS** (Keys to Educational and Youth Success) wellbeing initiative has been launched in conjunction with a new approach to year meetings and whole school assemblies. Themes include: expectations, cyberbullying, respectful relationships, study skills, managing emotions, resilience, school/life balance.

The final **coaching** session for our Year 12 students will be in week 8 Thurs 7th September and the focus will be: Transition from school.

The Year 8 subject selection evening (scheduled for 5.45pm) and the year 12 Information presentation (@7pm) are both on Wednesday16th September in the multi-purpose hall.

Year 11 examinations will begin week 8 Thursday 7th September.

Pencil the following event into your diaries: the **P&C Trivia Night** – Friday 15th September. This is always a fun filled occasion where you can mix with other parents and staff and raise funds for the school whilst testing your knowledge on all things not necessarily important! Food, beverages and fabulous prizes will be available.

The annual 'Tell them from me survey' for all members of our school community will commence in late August. Please note the detailed information form at the end of this report, along with the consent letter and student and parent FAQS sheets. The data from this survey informs school planning, so we encourage everyone to participate. You will be informed on when and how to complete the survey mid-August.

Literacy and Numeracy update: the school will be participating in the NAPLAN item trial for years 7 & 9, run by ACARA, as part of a pilot and delivered online.

During week 9, the school will also be participating in the School Readiness Testing, where the aim is to prepare for the move

to online testing. The readiness test is an opportunity to experience the online environment and the different question types that can be used in online testing. It is not a test of skills and knowledge. The readiness test is an assessment of the school's technical readiness to administer NAPLAN Online. It is an opportunity for schools to become familiar with the NAPLAN Online test platform and to identify any technical issues they may have.

The next round of the Year 9 NAPLAN Personal Best interviews will be held on Wednesday 6th September.

We acknowledge that there are many demands on our students, so it is important to reference the research that is available on how we can assist them with techniques and strategies to help them cope. Please note below some interesting insights on "Grit"

Improving student performance with Grit

An Educational Brief by Luke McKenna

"A lack of persistence and resilience is inhibiting educational outcomes for many students. Angela Duckworth (2007) is a prominent researcher in the field of grit, which she defines as "perseverance and passion for long term goals". Grit is about determination, resolve, resilience, discipline, self-control, persistence and a willingness to do whatever it takes to achieve important goals. Grit is an action that leads to learning, as it is a key to action that unlock human potential in every endeavour. Grit involves sticking with commitments until they come to fruition. It is not just about setting goals, it is about the things that lead to their achievement. The best tools we have for building grit include a growth mindset, delayed gratification, continuous improvement, mastery through deliberate practice, goal setting, habit formation and finally effort and energy management."

Added to this research are some timely comments from Mark Scott, the secretary of the NSW Department of Education, who recently stated that literacy and numeracy skills and delivering content knowledge in core subjects will continue to be critical, but so to will broader skills such as resilience, growth mindset and the capacity to fail and try again, to persevere.

Tell Them From Me student survey Frequently Asked Questions (parents and carers)

Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation

1. What is the *Tell Them From Me* student survey?

The Tell Them From Me student survey asks questions about factors that are known to affect academic achievement and other outcomes. It aims to help improve the learning outcomes of students. The survey is designed to measure, assess and report insights from the student point of view at the school and system levels. The focus of this NSW survey is on student wellbeing, engagement and effective teaching practices.

2. What kind of questions will the survey ask?

The survey questions relate to the following 18 measures for **primary schools**:

4. How will taking part in this survey benefit my child's school?

The Tell Them From Me student survey will provide school principals and school leaders with insight into student engagement, wellbeing and effective teaching practices at their school, from the perspective of students.

Data collected from the survey responses are quickly compiled into reports for school leaders. Principals can then use this information to help them identify emerging issues and plan for school improvement.

5. What does my child need to do to participate in the survey?

The survey typically takes less than 30 minutes and is conducted entirely online through a secure website operated by the survey developers, The Learning Bar. Schools will make computers or laptops available so that students can complete the survey during school hours.

6. Does my child have to participate?

No, participation in the survey is optional. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped. Parents/students have a right to apply for access to, and correction of, a student's information.

7. Will the school be able to identify my child from their responses?

Staff in schools will not be able to identify individual students

analysis. Individual students' data will be held on a secure server with access strictly limited to CESE researchers. The researchers are interested in trends only – not in individual student responses. No student will be identified in any publication. No school will be identified unless they have given permission.

8. What sort of analysis will be done on the survey data?

Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days. School leaders can use the data to better understand the experiences and views of students at their school.

CESE will undertake state-wide analysis of the survey data in conjunction with existing student data held by the department, including performance data.

The results will help all schools better understand the relationship between wellbeing, engagement, effective teaching and student learning. Results from CESE's analysis of this data will also help teachers and principals discuss what works to improve student outcomes. This supports the department's continuing focus on quality teaching and leadership. The data will be retained for future analysis to help us better understand the nature of student engagement and wellbeing over time.

9. Can all school students participate in the survey?

The primary school survey is designed for students in Years 4 to 6. Schools are encouraged to allow as many students as possible in these Year groups to participate. Secondary schools are encouraged to allow as many students as possible in Years 7 to 12 to participate.



What is CESE?

The Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) is part of the Department of Education.

CESE has been established to improve the effectiveness, efficiency and accountability of education in New South Wales.

CESE will identify and share what works, creating new opportunities to improve teaching and learning across all of education.

What is The Learning Bar?

The Learning Bar specialises in research-based design and facilitation of student assessments and survey solutions for both primary and secondary students. The in-house research team led by the President, Dr J Douglas Willms, undertakes extensive projects used in the school system to effect national policy. It is against this research that the survey, Tell Them From Me, has become the largest national school survey in Canada, used in nine of the ten provinces. More than 4,500 schools and 3.5 million Canadian students have participated in the survey over the last twelve years.

Dr Willms holds the Canada Research Chair in Literacy and Human Development and played a lead role in the development of questions on student engagement for the OECD's Programme for International Student Assessment (PISA).

For purely administrative purposes, *The Learning Bar* will also have temporary access to identifiable student responses to the survey questions. Other than *The Learning Bar* and CESE researchers within the department, identifiable student responses will not be disclosed to any other person or body other than as required by law.

Dear Parents and Carers

This term, our school is taking part in the *Tell Them From Me* student survey. The survey will provide us with valuable feedback on what our students think about school life, how engaged they are with school and the different ways that teachers interact with them. Schools in Australia and around the world have used the *Tell Them From Me* survey to help them improve. The survey is completed on-line and is run by an independent research company, **The Learning Bar**, which specialises in school-based surveys.

Staff in schools will <u>not</u> be able to identify individual students from their responses. To ensure confidentiality, participating students will receive a unique username and password. Where fewer than five students respond to a question, the results will be suppressed. The survey typically takes 30 minutes or less to complete and will be administered by the school during normal school hours. Once the surveys are completed by students, reports are prepared and in most cases are available to schools within three business days.

This survey will help our school better understand how to improve student wellbeing and engagement. It will help the school identify what works to improve student outcomes.

Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary. Your child will not take part if either you or your child do not wish. If, during the survey, your child is uncomfortable, he/she can choose to stop the survey at any time. The majority of questions in the survey can be skipped.

If you <u>do not want</u> your child to take part in the survey, please complete the attached form and return it to your child's school by August 25.

Year 9 NAPLAN results and the HSC minimum standard Message from NESA

HSC minimum standard required to receive the HSC from 2020

Literacy and numeracy skills are the foundation for success in life after school. This is why eligibility for the HSC is changing. From 2020, students will need to show they have the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to complete everyday tasks.

Your child will have many chances from Year 9 to Year 12, and even after the HSC to show they meet the HSC minimum standard

Some students will meet the requirement early through their Year 9 NAPLAN results in reading, writing and numeracy. However, most students will show they meet the standard by passing short, online reading, writing and numeracy tests in Years 10, 11 or 12.

You can watch a short video that explains Year 9 NAPLAN results and the new online HSC minimum standard tests at www.educationstandards.nsw.edu.au

Year 9 NAPLAN reports available in mid-August

Your child's Year 9 NAPLAN report will indicate which online HSC minimum standard test/s (if any) they will need to pass to be eligible for the HSC certificate. Remember your child has three more years of learning before the HSC and can take the HSC minimum standard online tests in Years 10, 11 or 12. Year 9 NAPLAN is a good chance to check they are on track or get support to meet the minimum standard by Year 12.

If your child has achieved a Band 8 or above in reading, writing or numeracy, the NAPLAN report will indicate that they have "Met the HSC minimum standard early" in the respective area/s.

Your child can sit the online HSC minimum standard tests when they are ready

There are three separate 45 minute online tests: reading, writing and numeracy. Students don't have to pass all three tests at once and can attempt each test up to twice a year.

The reading and numeracy tests each contain a maximum of 45 multiple choice questions.

The writing test will require students to respond to a question about a prompt or stimulus.

2017 Dulwich High School of Visual Arts and Design Archibald Excursion



On Wednesday the 9th of August 2017 the year 7 students from Dulwich High School of Visual Arts and Design went on an excursion to the Art Gallery of NSW (AGNSW). Viewing the Archibald, Wynne and Sulman exhibition, the students were able to engage with artworks by a number of significant contemporary Australian Artists and gain a better understanding of the genre of portraiture.

This excursion is an integral part of the unit of work on Portraiture and the Dully Archies hosted by the school. The Dully Archies is the annual exhibition of self portraits and portraits of people in the school community. Students learn about composition, proportions, painting techniques and art history and critical theory. A major facet of the NSW Visual Arts curriculum is for students to develop a deep of understand of the interaction between artists with their audience and the artworld as they produce their art.

Visiting a major state gallery and seeing the original artworks, rather than digital reproductions is a terrific experience and a privilege for the students. They were active members of the audience for the artworks.

'I have never, in all my forty years, been ungrateful for the animals of the world. I have always lived in a household with at least one pet. Yet, it was not until I walked my dog last Saturday that I truly began to value such companions, companions which, to me, had always been a part of the norm. It was a bitter winter's day, far enough into the season that the snow had stopped falling, and that which was left had been trodden into a dirty, icy layer. My dog, Nancy, a bright eyed and energetic Spaniel, trotted happily in front of me, as much walking me as I was her. 

UAC APPLICATIONS

Term 3 is very important for Yr12 students applying for university. Students will be required to submit an **online application to UAC by Sept 29**th to avoid a late fee. They will need for this **their NESA number and their UAC PIN** no which is being emailed on Aug 2nd. Students will be given a **UAC Handbook** which details courses and application instructions and I (Graham Spetere – Careers Advisor) will be available to assist with applications.

Some students will be eligible for a variety of associated programs depending on their circumstances. Students that have experienced various difficulties eg financial disadvantage, health issues may be able to apply for special consideration through the Educational Access Scheme (EAS) and/or Equity Scholarships, be interested in applying for School Recommendation Schemes that apply to some universities or other alternative pathway schemes such as the University of Sydney E12 scheme (financial eligibility criteria apply).


On the road again

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data School Students with Disability



Information for parents and carers

WHAT IS THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (the national data collection) is an annual collection that counts the number of school students receiving an adjustment due to disability and the level of reasonable adjustment they are receiving.

The national data collection counts students who have been identified by a school team as receiving an adjustment to address a disability as defined under the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (the DDA). The DDA can be accessed from the ComLaw website at www.comlaw.gov.au.

WHAT IS THE BENEFIT FOR MY CHILD?

The aim of the national data collection is to collect quality information about school students receiving an adjustment due to disability in Australia.

This information will help teachers, principals, education authorities and families to better support students with disability to take part in school on the same basis as other students.

The national data collection provides an opportunity for schools to review their learning and support systems and processes to continually improve education outcomes for their students with disability.

WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools across Australia collect information about students with disability. But the type of information currently collected varies between each state and territory and across government, Catholic and independent school sectors.

When undertaking the national data collection, every school in Australia uses the same method to collect information. Therefore, a government school in suburban Sydney collects and submits data in the same way as a Catholic school in country Victoria and an independent school in the Northern Territory.

The annual collection aims to, over time, lead to nationally consistent, high quality data that will enable schools, education authorities and governments to gain a more complete understanding of students who are receiving adjustments because of disability in schools in Australia, and how to best support them.

WHAT ARE SCHOOLS REQUIRED TO DO FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITY?

All students are entitled to a quality learning experience at school.

Schools are required to make reasonable adjustments, where needed, to assist students with disability to access and participate in education free from discrimination and on the same basis as other students.

These responsibilities are outlined in the DDA and the Disability Standards for Education 2005 (the Standards). The Standards require educators students, parents and others (e.g. allied health professionals) to work together so that students with disability can participate in education. The Standards can be accessed via the ComLaw website at www.comlaw.gov.au.

WHAT IS A REASONABLE ADJUSTMENT?

A reasonable adjustment is a measure or action taken to help a student with disability access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. Reasonable adjustments reflect the assessed individual needs of the student, and are provided in consultation with the student and/or their parents and carers. Reasonable adjustments can be made across the whole school setting (e.g. ramps into school buildings), in the classroom (such as adapting teaching methods) and at an individual student level (e.g. extra tuition for a student with learning difficulties).

WHAT INFORMATION WILL BE COLLECTED?

Every year your child's school will collect the following information for each student receiving an adjustment due to disability:

- the student's level of education (i.e. primary or secondary)
- the student's level of adjustment
- the student's broad type of disability.

National Parents/Carers Fact Sheet Version No. 5 as at March 2017



The information collected by schools will be available to all governments to inform policy and program improvement for students with disability.

WHO IS INCLUDED IN THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

The definition of disability for the national data collection is based on the broad definition under the DDA.

For the purposes of the national data collection, students with learning difficulties, such as dyslexia or auditory processing disorder, as well as chronic health conditions like epilepsy or diabetes, that require monitoring and the provision of adjustments by the school, may be included.

WHO COLLECTS INFORMATION FOR THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION?

Teachers and school staff count the number of students receiving an adjustment due to disability in their school, and the level of reasonable adjustment they are provided, based on:

- consultation with parents and carers in the course of determining and providing reasonable adjustments
- the school team's observations and professional judgements
- any medical or other professional diagnosis
- · other relevant information.

School principals are responsible for ensuring the information identified about each student is accurate.

HOW IS MY CHILD'S PRIVACY PROTECTED?

Protecting the privacy and confidentiality of all students and their families is essential and is an explicit focus of the national data collection. Personal details, such as student names or other identifying information, are not provided to local or federal education authorities.

Further information about privacy is available from www.education.gov.au/notices.

IS THE NATIONAL DATA COLLECTION COMPULSORY?

Yes. All education ministers agreed to full implementation of the national data collection from 2015. This means that all schools must now collect and submit information annually on the number of students receiving adjustments due to disability in their care, and the level of adjustment they receive.



You should expect to hear much discussion about Year 7 portraits as all students develop portrait paintings of someone from the DHSVAD community and showcase their efforts in our Seaview Gallery later in Term 3.

ABOUT US

ASteen is a Sydney social group for young people aged 13 and over, diagnosed with high functioning Autism Spectrum Disorder (previously known as Asperger's Syndrome) who are generally capable of functioning without specialist help. ASteen was started in 2004 by a group of parents to fill an unmet need for their AS teens, who were able to communicate and interact with others but had difficulty doing this in mainstream situations.

The group gives our teens the opportunity to socialise with others like themselves in a supportive environment. From feeling like complete outsiders, ASteen has given many of them a sense of belonging and the confidence that they too can make friends. In fact, many of our original members are now young adults and still enjoy the family outings.

OUTINGS AND COSTS

There is no cost to join the group; just the cost of the outings themselves. Our outings range from picnics,

museum trips and movies through to putt-putt golf, ghost tours, and theatre visits.

Outings are held all over the Sydney region, and members come from as far away as Berowra in the north, the Blue Mountains in the west, Miranda in the south and Bondi in the east. Families take turns to organise outings, which occur fortnightly on weekends. From time to time, members organise ad hoc activities outside the regular schedule, and this works well too.

Suggestions for outings are entered into a calendar, which is updated from time to time and circulated by a volunteer calendar coordinator; final details are emailed to members by the host family shortly before each event. New families are encouraged to help plan outings, as the group is always looking for new things to see and do.

Attendance varies, depending on the outing, weather, the mood of the teens, holidays etc. We are quite flexible about this and understand if outings occasionally need to be cancelled or postponed at the last minute.

COMMUNICATION

We communicate through a Yahoo email group, which is moderated by volunteer parents. The email group is not used as a support mechanism and is primarily for the purpose of organising activities. Information relating to Autism Spectrum Disorders is also circulated from time to time, for informational purposes only.

Every few months, we circulate a list containing the mobile phone numbers of the parents whose families attend outings regularly. This is a handy tool to help members locate each other when arriving at activities. We generally wait for a family to attend a few outings before putting them on this list, as it would be far too unwieldy to include the large number of families who are members of the wider group.

FAMILY INVOLVEMENT

One of the features that we feel makes ASteen successful is that parents, and often siblings and family friends, attend the outings with their teens.

We find that unlike mainstream teenagers, AS teens like having parents along as it gives them a sense of security. The parents also enjoy our outings because it is a chance to make friends amongst others who understand. At the same time, because we are not a professional "service", it ensures that the responsibility for the safety of the teens is carried by their own family.

WILL IT HELP MY SON/DAUGHTER?

The group does not work for everyone. Whilst there are many AS teens who are keen to make friends but lack the necessary skills, there are also those who prefer their own company. These young people might attend a few outings and decide that they don't like group environments. That said, many AS teens have gotten and continue to get a lot of enjoyment from our group and have forged new friendships, as have their parents.

How to Join Us

Please contact our valunteer coordinator Adrienne De Morais on 0413 890 311 for membership enquiries or more information.

If the group is suitable for your teen, you will be given further information about completing a registration form and the Working with Children (WWC) Check.

The WWC check is required by NSW law. It needs to be completed by most primary carers who have responsibility for young people and wish to participate in the group. However, there are exceptions in certain instances, for example if your child is under the age of 18.

From Our School Counsellor

Tips for a healthy headspace



Change your self-talk

Self-talk is the way that you talk to yourself, that voice inside your head. It can be positive (e.g. "I can make it through this exam") or negative (e.g. "I'm never going to be able to pass this subject"). There are a number of things you can do to change the direction of your self-talk. First, listen to your inner voice – is your self-talk helping you or reinforcing bad feelings? Next, try to replace your negative thoughts with more realistic ones. Try to look for a more rational spin of strategies to tackle your up hope. By working on your self-talk the more you'll feel confident and in control of yourself.

Develop assertiveness skills

Being assertive means standing up for your own rights; valuing yourself and valuing others' opinions without letting them dominate you. This can help build your self-esteem and self-respect. Being assertive is not the same as being aggressive. Remember to always listen, be prepared to compromise and be respectful of the other person's opinion, while still being confident, calm and knowing what you want.

Relax

There are many ways to relax and different relaxation techniques to use to overcome stress. Progressive muscle relaxation involves tensing and relaxing specific groups of muscles from your feet all the way to your head, while focussing on your feelings of tension and relaxation. You could also try breathing techniques, such as deep breathing or focussed breathing (breathing in through the nose and as you breathe out say a positive statement to yourself like 'relax' or 'calm down'). Place a hand over your diaphragm to make sure you're breathing slowly – you should feel your hand move if you're doing it right. Focus on breathing in slowly for 4 seconds, holding your breath for 2 seconds and breathing out slowly for 6 seconds.

Practice conflict resolution

Having a hard time with friends or family is difficult for most people. Talking through the issues in a calm and thoughtful way is the best approach.

Avoid getting personal, be willing to compromise and listen to their perspective.

Help and be kind to others

Do something to help someone else. Acts of kindness help other people but also make you feel good. Give a compliment, offer to help someone out or volunteer either on a once-off project or an ongoing basis and allow yourself to feel good for making someone else feel good.

Be socially active and get involved

Social relationships are really important to your general wellbeing. It is okay to take time out for yourself but friends can provide support when you're having a tough time. Spending time with friends is also really important for keeping and building on existing friendships. Getting involved with volunteer work, hobbies, clubs or committees, or sports can help you feel connected to your wider community while also meeting new people. If you're not feeling up to going out, even a phone call, email, text message or Facebook message can help us feel connected to friends and family.

Play



Play is important for staying mentally healthy. Devoting time to just having fun can recharge your battery, revitalise your social networks, and reduce stress and anxiety.



A problem can sometimes be too hard to solve alone, even with support from friends and family. Be honest with yourself about when you may need support and get professional help. You can see your general practitioner (GP), make an appointment to chat to someone at your local headspace centre or visit eheadspace.org.au. Finding help might feel scary at the start but it gets easier over time. Getting support can help you to keep on track with school, study or work, and in your personal and family relationships. The sooner you get help the sooner things can begin to improve for you.


