

#### From the Principal's Desk

Year 12 are finishing up their second term of studies. Students are reminded to do a study plan for the holidays and stick to it, plan time with family, friends and perhaps a bit of exercise. Eat well and get at least 8 hours of sleep per day. Parents you may need the same to have the energy to support your children! As always we are here to help if needed.

Year 11 are almost half way through their course and are travelling well. Stay focused and keep the end in mind.

All parents are invited for the upcoming **Cyber Safety Presentation** on Wednesday 15 May at 7 pm. The P&C will send out the details. It is important that you RSVP for the event so we can organise seating if needed. We had our senior psychologist do a presentation supported by the R/Head Teacher Wellbeing at the last P&C meeting about services available to support student wellbeing.

**Safety on the net**...students are reminded that they need to be respectful at all times including social platforms. Relationships, Responsibilities and Respect are our core values and it is an expectation that students practice these in all situations including school, community, globally and on E platforms.

The staff have started their twilight sessions of professional learning this term. Schools are given the option to vary the school development days for staff. This means that our school staff will participate in 4 late afternoon/evenings of professional learning instead of two full days (19 and 20 December). Therefore the last day for staff is on Wednesday the 18 December. The last day for students is on the 18 December. This has not changed.

Parents are requested to plan with their child how to get to school on time. Being organised with equipment, uniform/dress code and planning ahead for punctuality are important life long skills.

All absences must have an explanation from parents/carer and only for emergency reasons. Doctor's appointments need to be made for after school as much as possible. ## **From the Deputy Principals**

#### Academic Care

Academic care is an ongoing important focus and one of our key priorities in our School Plan. We aim to provide a variety of targeted programs to cater for the wellbeing needs of our diverse student population so they can **connect**, **succeed** and **thrive**. Two of these initiatives include additional study support for senior students and the use of the Academic Care Hub.

#### Study Support

The school is currently providing study support across a variety of platforms for students to access. Homework Club is supervised by staff and is available to all students on Monday afternoons in the school library from 3- 4.30pm.

Senior study support is available on Tuesday afternoons during sport. Ms Tessadri offers her expertise and assistance with academic writing, planning and general learning support to all senior students during this time. Please encourage your child to access these resources as they provide the opportunity to revise outcomes, receive feedback and collaborate with staff and peers to consolidate their learning.

#### Academic Care Hub

The Academic Care Hub is an online platform, where students are able to set personal and study goals and reflect on their capabilities, career aspirations and successes. This year, all students will be accessing their own Personalised Learning Plan on the Academic Care Hub to set their goals. Following this, students will be reviewing their goals with staff to assist them to reflect on their achievements. We anticipate that this will become an integral tool that can be utilised to guide and support the learning and wellbeing of students.



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

## **TAS Faculty**

We are coming to the end of the term and it only seems a few days ago that we began the school year. It is never too late to welcome the Year 7 students to our school community and wish them all the best during their six years of high school. I would also like to take the opportunity to welcome all students and I am happy to report that they have settled into their years very quickly and are working hard toward achieving their course outcomes. Teachers are very happy with the progress of their students and there are many exciting things happening in classrooms and in the faculty.

I would like to welcome Ms Chloe Chevell who has been appointed through merit as a TAS/Hospitality teacher. We wish her luck in her career at Dulwich.

#### Year 7 and 8

The faculty is implementing the new Technology Mandatory syllabus. Students will now undertake 4 units of work on a rotational base. The syllabus requires 4 areas of study: Digital Technologies, Agriculture and Food Technologies, Materials Technologies and Engineering Systems.

Each unit of work includes the study of Design thinking, Computational thinking and System thinking through the completion of a design project, where students apply problem solving, decision making, creative and critical thinking skills.

Year 8 continues with the old syllabus during 2019, undertaking 3 units of work focusing on Architectural Design, Industrial Design (timber) and Textiles Design.

We also offer 2 NE8 classes: Makerspace and Electronics.



## **TAS Faculty cont.**

#### Year 9 and 10

Elective subjects in Years 9 and 10 are Design and Technology, Industrial Technology, Timber and Food Technology. In addition, the Design and Technology faculty offers the following NEO courses: Textiles Design, Food Styling and Photography, Video Game Design and Graphic Design.

All courses are now finalising their first unit of work and assessment tasks, students are working enthusiastically to achieve the outcomes to the best of their ability.



Y12 Design and Technology, Industrial Technology –Timber and Textiles and Design students are working very enthusiastically with their Major Design Projects. Students are working on a variety of projects, from Architecture to Jewellery Design, from Interior Design to Industrial Design; all projects show high complexity problems and high creative

#### Subjects Fees Department of Education - Elective Subject Contributions




Subject fees are distinct from school contributions. Subject fees reimburse the school for the purchase of materials directly used by students. Within the Design and Technology department, the majority of our budget is spent on consumables, such as food, timber, fabric, etc. That is, the day to day materials and equipment that we depend upon to deliver our specialised curriculum to your child. In this regard, the amount of money that we received has a direct impact upon the quality teaching within the classroom.

## **English Faculty**

English students at Dulwich High School of Visual Arts and Design have begun the year enthusiastically, examining the way the texts they study are a response to the world in which they are written. The focus of this term has been to encourage students to be active participants in their learning, engaging in self-reflection activities and the ongoing refinement of their writing choices.

Year 7 English students have been learning about Visual Literacy and have been analysing a range of picture books. In particular, they have studied the work of Shaun Tan, an Australian author/illustrator who composes rich, complex and, sometimes, disturbing picture books on the darker facets of the human experience. Students are currently hard at work creating their own multi-layered picture book that is rich in both narrative and visuals.

Year 8 English students are studying the Science Fiction genre, which frequently asks the question, 'What does it mean to be human?' Students have explored a series of short texts that question the nature of humanity amidst technological developments and have engaged in a close study of the novel Ender's Game. Students have been constructing a piece of science fiction and have engaged in the craft of writing processesss, requiring them to plan, draft, reflect upon and refine their writing choices.

Year 9 English students are learning about the evolution of the Crime Fiction genre, from Edgar Allan Poe right through to Scandi-Noir. Students studied the Sherlock Holmes tale The Hound of the Baskervilles and compared it a Hard-Boiled crime story The Red Wind. Students then viewed a constructed crime scene as inspiration for their own piece of crime fiction.



Year 10 English students are learning about the literary canon, evaluating the ongoing appeal of classic novels such as To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee and Animal Farm by George Orwell. Students are currently refining their critical essay writing skills and drafting responses to their prescribed texts as 'Classics' that transcend time and place.

Year 11 English students are currently engaging in the 'Reading to Write' unit, which emphasises the importance of wide reading as a mechanism to develop one's skills as a writer. Students are exploring the Speculative Fiction genre as an avenue for highlighting societal concerns and fears. Standard English students are studying the text World War Z by Max Books, while Advanced English students are analysing Margaret Atwood's The Handmaid's Tale. Students are currently working on a writing portfolio, in which they are required to demonstrate the way their reading has developed their understanding of the concepts explored and influenced their writing choices.

Year 11 Extension students are currently exploring the idea of moral ambiguity, examining Niccolo Machiavelli's The Prince and his lasting legacy. Students are currently crafting an imaginative piece that explores the complex nature of morality and the way it is influenced by context.

Year 12 English have just completed their Module A Assessment Tasks. Standard students have examined the Australian classic The Castle, looking at the way Language, Culture and Identity are represented in the film. Advanced students have undertaken a comparative study of Shakespeare's *Richard III* with Al Pacino's intertextual transformation *Looking for Richard*.

Year 11 Drama recently performed their Group Devised Performances, crafting a piece of original theatre from scratch.

Year 12 Drama are currently hard at work polishing their black comedy performance essays, reflecting on the way in which Harold Pinter's The Homecoming and Neil La Bute's The Shape of Things explore the taboo in an attempt to provoke catharsis in the audience.



Year 9 and 10 have both been experimenting with spoken Japanese, through their video assessment tasks. We are looking forward to seeing their language skills in practice, and are excited to see what interesting and funny videos they have produced!

Year 11 Beginners and Continuers are settling into their HSC courses, and have been learning the foundations of Japanese in preparation for the rest of their senior years. Year 11 are experiencing for the first time what it is to participate in a topical and fluent Japanese conversation. Meanwhile, Year 12 have just completed their listening and writing assessment task, and have begun preparations for their Term 2 topics.

On April 10, we will be departing on our bi-annual study tour of Japan with students from Year 10 and Year 11. Our students will be experiencing and practicing Japanese in real life situations and interacting with the local people. We hope our students benefit educationally from the study tour.





## **ARTMonth 2019**

Our ARTMonth workshops this year have produced amazing art work from our Artstream students.

It is always important to note that what the students produce is the result of just one day's activity.

Each workshop begins with an artist's talk on their artistic practice followed by concept thinking, acquiring skills and producing the art work.

Students are called upon to use their creative thinking, problem solving and aesthetic application skills over the course of the day. The goal is not about producing sophisticated or technically strong artworks, but more about extending the students into new realms of experience under the guidance of very accomplished artists.

It is a collective effort by many people, but the end result is always about providing our students with opportunities to grow in skills, knowledge, ideas and confidence, creativity at work!









## **Science Faculty**

Welcome back to the new school year! A special welcome to Koula lordanidis who has joined the Science Faculty this year.

Science is a compulsory subject in years 7 to 10. The course covered follows NSW Board of Studies Stage 4-5 Science syllabus and provides a formal study of science with emphasis on the methods used in science as well as knowledge of facts and processes. Students are encouraged to work independently wherever possible to provide answers to scientific problems and conduct research into areas of interest.

In Year 7, students study the topics: Starting Science, Separating Mixtures, The Particle Idea, Cells, Classification, Rocks & Minerals and Forces & Energy. Some of the activities students conduct in class include, practical investigations, building models, research and computer tasks.

In Year 8, students study the topics: Elements, Compounds and Mixtures, Health and Human Body Systems, Electricity, Plants & Ecology, Resources & Sustainability and Space. Students will be required to complete a research project for the topic on Plants.

Topics covered in the Year 9 Australian Science Curriculum include: Forensics, Chemistry, Electrical Energy & Energy Efficiency, Reproduction, Sustainability, Disasters and Tectonics, Co-ordination and Waves. Students will build on their skills in Science and further develop their aptitude in research and the use of technology in the classroom. Students will be required to complete a research project for the topic Disasters and Tectonics.

Topics covered in the Year 10 Australian Science Curriculum include: Disease and Immunity, Genetics, Evolution, Chemistry, Forces, Energy & Motion and the Universe. Other class activities include, working scientifically on Individual Research Projects, practical investigations, building models, research and computer tasks.

This semester in Year 11 Physics, students were asked to design, build and measure the motion of a speed racer. Using paddle pop sticks, cardboard, small 3V DC motors, fans, toy wheels and A4 batteries, the students attempt to design their racers to maximise velocity and the "straightness" of the racer's course. It's not often that students look forward to an assessment task, however this task has proven very popular.

The post-assessment race is very competitive.

Todra, Nathan and Angus measure the travel time of their racer over 6m at half metre intervals (left).






Year 11 Chemistry students have been modelling chemical bonds for their first in-depth study.

## Science Faculty cont.

Year 11 Biology are studying cells as the basic unit of life. This is a microscopic view of an animal cell seen under a light microscope at high power X40. They also tested a leaf for starch to see whether it is necessary for photosynthesis to take place.

#### Year 9 have made a great start to 2019.

Most students have settled into their new timetables and have genuinely committed their best efforts to their classes. Many students are enjoying their elective subjects and new NEO subjects and by now students should have a weekly homework routine in place. Parents and carers are encouraged to use the bright orange Year 9 Assessment Information booklet to support the ongoing learning of their child. Students should also be checking their Google classroom pages each week to find resources, scaffolds and materials to support learning. A reminder to all students and families that when students are away, apart from contacting the school, they also have the responsibility to catch up on work missed and to hand in any tasks that were due on the day that they return to school. Students can apply for extensions if they have been ill or have significant reasons for missing tasks. To apply for extensions, students must see the Head Teacher of the particular subject and complete a form.





### Year 9 Report cont...



Over Terms 2 and 3 many Year 9 students will have the opportunity to participate in two wellbeing programs.

RAISE is a youth mentoring program that has had a very successful association with our school. All students in Year 9 have had the chance to put their names forward for this program. 16 students will meet with mentors over a 12 week period. Research shows that quality mentoring greatly increases a young person's confidence and self-respect. For teenagers, mentoring greatly reduces the risk of mental health issues, drug and alcohol addiction, teenage pregnancy, juvenile justice issues, homelessness, and poverty in later life. All Raise mentors participate in high quality training and the program is supported by a qualified Counsellor who supervises the mentoring match to maximise outcomes for students involved. Mentoring will take place on Thursdays in Term 2. You can find out more about the program at: https://raise.org.au/

In addition to RAISE mentoring, another large group of Year 9 students will have the chance to participate in the LEAPS (Lawyer Encouraging and Assisting Promising Students) program.

As part of this long running program, students attend a law firm every two weeks. The LEAPS program has clear aims which are to:

- increase student engagement in learning
- increase student motivation to complete high school and undertake further education
- provide the students with access to expanded vocational and career options, and insight into the corporate environment
- enhance student performance in a range of skills including goal setting, decision making, negotiating and constructing a coherent argument.
- broaden students' experience

The LEAPS mentoring sessions focus on sharing skills, encouraging students to set career and life goals, and empowering them to effectively deal with challenges and opportunities they will encounter in their lives. The program also takes place in Term 2. I trust that our students will learn more about themselves, their goals and possible career options, the role of higher education in attaining their career goals, and the pathways into these professions through these rewarding experiences.




