This term, students in year 10 will be participating in a coaching and mentoring program which will assist them to make informed choices about their preferred study patterns for their Higher School certificate. Information regarding the HSC, ATAR and subject selection process will be outlined to all students including TVET and TAFE courses available for 2020.

Careers Day for all year 10 students will be held on Thursday 27 June. This field trip will provide a range of workshops for students to learn more about the opportunities that present themselves in the senior years. Specific information about tertiary studies including Universities and TAFE will be available to students at the expo. This is always a great opportunity for them to ask questions and gather insight into post school options. Ms King, our new Careers Advisor will be overseeing this occasion and will be involved in mentoring students over the course of the entire subject selection process to ensure students are making suitable choices.

Excursion to the Sydney Jewish Museum

One of our Year 10 History classes went to the Sydney Jewish Museum as part of their studies on World War Two and Rights and Freedoms. We were fortunate to hear from Holocaust survivor, Francine, who told us her personal experiences of survival in Belgium as a Jewish child. Her oral history gave students a deep understanding of the extent family and strangers went to, to protect Jewish children and her strength in sharing such a traumatic experience. After, we had an interactive tour of the Museum learning about the Holocaust through personal items and histories.

Our final session involved engaging with Aboriginal Australians struggle for rights and freedoms during the 20th century through the lens of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Both students and teacher enjoyed our day engaging with significant aspects of our History.

Where the rainforest meets the reef

Over the first four days of the April school holidays, 21 students from Earth and Environmental Science and HSC Geography embarked on a fieldtrip to two of the world's most stunning natural World Heritage sites: the Daintree Rainforest in the Wet Tropics of QLD and the Great Barrier Reef. Walking through ancient rainforest, snorkelling crystal blue waters, swimming with turtles and countless colourful fish, and engaging in community service for the homeless were just some of activities we participated in. The excursion was an incredible learning experience for our students, providing them with real life case studies of syllabus content. The group participated in fieldwork that enabled them to see the impact of human activity, in particular tourism and land clearing for development. Immersing ourselves in such truly awe-inspiring environments emphasises our responsibility as citizens to be active and vocal about protecting them.

Plans for the 2020 trip are now underway.

Amazing facts about the Daintree and the GBR

- Both environments are what scientists and geographers call **carbon sinks** absorbing and storing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and environment.
- They also both act as **environmental mitigators**: the Daintree holds large areas of soil together, reducing **erosion and transportation** into the Daintree River, while the GBR's system provides coastal protection from destructive waves and king tides.
- Did you know that the Daintree Rainforest is the oldest living rainforest in the world? It is estimated to be about 150 million years old! The rainforest has been dated back to the Pangea supercontinent that means that plants that grew alongside dinosaurs still stand today. More than 100 animals are rare or threatened here and dozens of species live nowhere else in the world.
- It is home to thousands of species of birds and other wildlife including 30% of Australia's frog, reptile and marsupial species in Australia, 65% of the country's bat and butterfly species, as well as, 18% of all bird species. 12,000 insect species can also be found right there.
- The Wet Tropics where the Daintree is situated has the highest concentration of primitive flowering plant families in the world, Australia's rarest mammal (the Murina florious bat) and 13 species of birds found nowhere else on earth.
- The Great Barrier Reef is home to 6 of the 7 species of marine turtle, over 4000 different species of fish, 100s of species of soft and hard coral, and home to a large amount of molluscs, cnidarians and echinoderms!!!

Bookings are essential so I encourage students to visit the website on the flier attached today.

I'd also like to acknowledge the huge amount of work and collaboration the Year 12 Jersey Committee have put into our design concept for 2020. Many designs and styles were offered and reviewed, and several committee and year group votes meant the final product truly represents the preferences of the majority.
